# Whangarei grower meeting

# GoldFutures project reviews

South Auckland and Waikato growers involved in the GoldFutures project met early September to review data from year two of this four-year Psa research project. Tauranga, Te Puke and Edgecumbe growers similarly met in August to discuss their results and workshop orchard specific improvements for the 2019 season. The GoldFutures project is led by Phillip Elmer and Stephen Hoyte from Plant and Food Research and includes 10 orchard pairs, all with challenging environmental conditions for Psa.

### **Reporting Psa symptoms**

If Psa-like symptoms are found for the first time on an orchard they must be reported to KVH on 0800 665 825. Growers can also contact their pack-house technical representative for advice and sample collection if required. Hill Laboratories carry out routine Psa testing weekly on Wednesday only but can process samples urgently at KVH request.

### Know your orchard weeds: cleavers

Orchard owners, managers and their teams are, year-by-year, battling a range of weeds within the orchard, ensuring they don't take over. It's good to know a bit more about the plants we often battle.

You know early spring has arrived when the weed known as cleavers grows up into and from shelter belts. This scrambling annual weed is a native of temperate Europe and Asia and was one of our earliest established weeds – first noticed about 140 years ago. It is a nuisance plant but one that can completely smother lower trunks and branches of especially shelter trees.

# Managing the BMSB risk

KVH continues to advocate strongly on behalf of the industry for strict biosecurity border controls which will make it harder for the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug (BMSB) to make its way here. There have been additional measures for the high-risk Vehicles, Machinery and Equipment Pathways introduced. The measures now target risk goods from 16 countries. New measures have also been introduced for vehicles from Japan after the high number of interceptions on this pathway last season.

# MPI to get tough on stink bug ships

With the support of KVH, biosecurity officials at the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) are promising to take tough action against cargo vessels believed to be infested with the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug (BMSB) during the upcoming risk season. If an arriving ship is infested with stink bug it will be prevented from discharging its cargo and directed to leave New Zealand. There is a very low threshold for determining contamination.

Growers are reminded that one of the requirements within the National Psa-V Pest Management Plan (NPMP) is that orchards are pruned and tied down by 1 October yearly. KVH is aware that pruning and tying down is still being completed on some orchards.
