No let up in fruit fly response



Restrictions remain in place in Northcote to contain the Queensland Fruit Fly (QFF), including a network of surveillance traps which attract male fruit flies and are regularly checked.

It is that continued vigilance that led to the discovery of another single male fruit fly on Monday 15 July 2019 in a trap in the current controlled area, 350 metres from where the last was found at the end of May.

KVH is pleased with new rules released by Biosecurity New Zealand to keep Brown Marmorated Stink Bugs (BMSB) out of New Zealand.


