Kill a large woolly nightshade in 60 seconds

Shelterbelts need to be free of weeds that cause problems in the orchard. KVH has regularly alerted orchardists to get rid of weeds such as moth plant, woolly nightshade and pampas, all native to South America and hosts of the Australian insect passion vine hopper, which causes sooty mould to develop on fruit – a significant reject factor reducing kiwifruit orchard returns.

Strict biosecurity requirements for imported cargo have reduced the threat of Brown Marmorated Stink Bug (BMSB) and even tougher rules will be introduced next season. There were 57 interceptions of live BMSB during the 2019/20 season (September 2019 to April 2020) – a reduction of 73% from the previous season.

Be aware of the rules around moving nursery plants

If you have purchased young kiwifruit plants and have them sitting in a temporary nursery please check with KVH before moving them to avoid inadvertently breaking plant movement control rules. Moving diseased plants to multiple locations could quickly spread threats such as a new or resistant forms of Psa or an undetected harmful soil pathogen.


